The priest introduces the Eucharist

At Christmas we heard the angels' message proclaiming 'Peace to all on earth.' Forty days later, as we recall the sacred moment when Christ was presented in the temple, we hear the voice of Simeon singing the praises of Jesus, the salvation promised to all the nations.

On this day, in the temple, the pain of love and the cost of salvation is declared, and God is praised for all he has done to lead his people from darkness into his own wonderful light.

As our Christmas celebrations come to a close we cling to the light of the Christ child. Led by the Spirit, let us go to the house of God, embracing the Light that has come into the world, and singing his praises. There we will recognise him in the breaking of bread, proclaiming his death and resurrection until he comes again.

Malachi 3. 1-5

A reading from the book of the prophet Malachi.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?
For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

Then I will draw near to you for judgement; I will be swift to bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear me, says the Lord of hosts.

Luke 2. 22-40

Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to Saint Luke.
Glory to you, O Lord.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
a light for revelation to the Gentiles
and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
Praise to you, O Christ.

The Invitation to Holy Communion

Jesus is the Lamb of God

All those who are baptised (Christened) are welcome to receive Holy Communion today. Baptised (Christened) children are welcome to receive holy communion at the discretion of their parents.

If you are not receiving you are welcome to come forward for a blessing but please bring this leaflet with you as a signal to the priest.

Today's Readings

Micah 3. 1-5

Malachi predicts the coming of a messenger to the Temple who will purify 'the descendants of Levi' and will enable God to draw near to judge those who oppress the vulnerable.

Psalm 24. 7-10

Hebrews 2. 14-end

Jesus is described as a human being sharing human characteristics, but one who destroys the power of death, thus freeing those who fear death. He is a merciful and faithful High Priest, able to help those who are being tested.

Luke 2. 22-40

When the baby Jesus is presented in the Temple, old Simeon and Anna both recognise him as someone very special who will reveal the inner thoughts of many but who will also be the cause of pain to his parents.
